**Sir GEORGE H. HUME, J.P., M.P., L.C.C., President
London Association in Aid of Moravian Missions**

"There is abundant evidence that fields are waiting to be opened for the Gospel to pour in its beneficent light.

From East Central Africa an urgent call has come. Unevangelised Villages are asking for the Gospel. Lack of the necessary money to build and equip Mission Halls is the main obstacle.

For some years a devoted young lady toiled in the Bush as a Christian Nurse and two years ago paid the price with her life. Owing to funds being inadequate she has never been replaced and her loss to the Cause of Christ in East Central Africa is inestimable.

In Africa there is an ever-growing need among the Lepers. The Moravian Mission has started a work among these poor sufferers, but there are a great many yet without the help and consolation that Christianity alone can give.

This book is intended for the help of young Sunday School teachers and young people who are witnessing for Jesus Christ, many of whom have limited time for Bible reading and study. It is through the "eye-gate" as well as the "ear-gate" that the work of Bible teaching must be done and children are usually interested in the children who live "over the sea," and the fact that Bible lands and customs are in many respects as they were in New and even in Old Testament days makes the picturing of the Bible background not so difficult as some may suppose.
